Future of Hammond's youth

Adrian Pederick - Liberal

If elected, the state Liberals will expand the Regional Development Fund to \$15 million annually, which will support up to 6000 jobs and \$1.5 billion in regional investment and drive productivity to boost our economy and create jobs.

Damien Pyne - The Greens

The Greens support an equitable National Broadband Network that reaches the homes of all Australians. Local medical practitioners will be able to access world-class resources from their own clinic.



Young entrepreneurs will be able to be globally competitive from their own local office. The Greens also support the Gonski

reforms that will bring extra funding to country schools, as well as maintaining the public funding of Murray Bridge TAFE.

Rachel Titley - Nationals

Investment by State Government in roads and public transport will enable Hammond residents to access further education and employment opportunities and will free up LGA funds for local event, local improvements and local opportunities.
