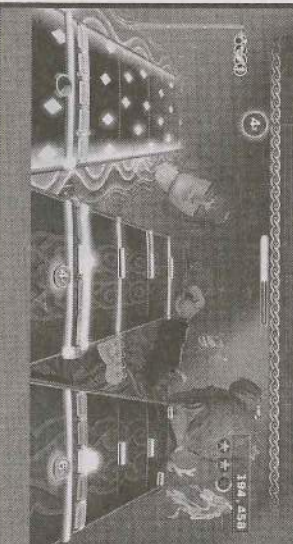

Rock Band 4

It's either coincidence or there were underground dealings somewhere to ensure that October 2015 would be 'Rock Revival Month'... why not call it 'Last-Ditch Retro Roctober', or 'Cash-Grab Month'...

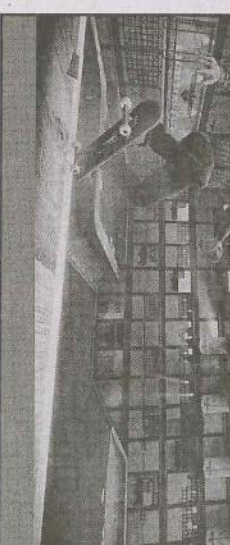
Rock Band 4 almost treats the last five years like they didn't happen, reemphasizes everything that made the franchise great in the first place: co-op gameplay with up to four players (or more with extra microphones), an extensive song library with a healthy tracklist and durable peripherals.

The most notable part of RB4 is that the majority of your instruments will work with the new game. Gameplay still boils down to strumming and tapping as capsules scroll down the board, while vocals are about matching pitch or the spoken lyrics.

The recognisable gameplay has been improved in several respects: vocal harmonies make a comeback, you can hit improvisational guidelines for vocals on the harder difficulties, and drum fills have been altered to make it simpler to keep the beat.

The lack of online multiplayer and Practice Mode is disappointing, but reliving the experience of local co-op covers the difference.

Tony Hawk's Pro Skater 5

THPS5 makes a strong first impression by throwing a skate video featuring the game's pro skater cast, then, the intuitive and easy-to-navigate menus.

The moment that you step on a skateboard you're reminded of why THPS has been so popular: linking grinds and big airs with manuals and reverts is exciting and methodical, while pulling off flips and grabs remain just as you remember.

There are eight stages to skate on, each with a distinct theme and unique mechanical elements. There are a good amount of missions on each stage, so expect to spend close to an hour on a stage.

The online activities are the stars of multiplayer, with King Of The Hill and point challenges creating intense competition between up to 20 players; this works relatively well, although the framerate will drop well below the smooth 60fps it wants.

THPS5 comes across as very familiar, even its presentation doesn't stray far from its early roots. Its visual quality isn't favourable, with everything from the game's environments to character models and animations appearing unrefined and dated... and this becomes worse in the later stages.

This is made worse by a day-one patch (over 7Gb, larger in size than the entire game!) but is still not enough to put things in a glitch-free happy space. THPS5 moments of thrilling gameplay and competitive multiplayer are sidetracked by bad performance, poor implementation, and glitches.

Federal backing to Combat Coorong seals

Member for Hammond Adrian Pederrick has been informed by local Federal colleague, Tony Pasin MP, that the Federal Environment Minister, Greg Hunt MP has indicated that the Commonwealth Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation (EPBC) Act has no jurisdiction over action being taken in Zealand/Long-nosed fur seals.

No Federal Hurdles

Member for Barker,

Tony Pasin MP, met with local leaders in Meningie last Thursday 1st October and confirmed that Federal legislation does not stand in the way of dealing with the issue of Long Nosed Fur Seals in the Coorong and Lower Lakes.

Initially it was thought that the species was protected under the Commonwealth Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act (EPBC) Act as well as in the South Australian National Park and Wildlife Act.

Further investigation by Mr Pasin and the Federal Minister for the Environment Greg

Hunt MP however has revealed there are no Federal legislative obstacles in place, as the Coorong and Lower Lakes are outside of Commonwealth waters.

"These seals are a significant problem for the Coorong and Lower Lakes. I have been engaging with the Minister in Canberra on a regular basis to see what can be done on a Federal level to facilitate a sustainable seal harvest," Mr Pasin said.

"The fact that we can now confirm that

Federal Legislation holds no obstacle to dealing with this issue means that it's time for the State Government to step up and take action.

Mr Pasin has met with the Southern Fisherman's Association and local Ngarrindjeri elder Darrell Sumner today in Meningie.

"This isn't only an economic and ecological issue for our local community but a deep cultural one as well. A broad spectrum of the local community is calling for a sustain-
